## **LEADERS who are God-called and Equipped** are desperately needed in the church.

1 Tim. 5:22 "Lay hands suddenly on no man..." **Plan your work and work your plan.** 1 Tim. 3:1 "If a man desires the office of a bishop he desires a good work." Scofield - "To aspire to leadership is an honorable ambition." N.E.B.

#### **LEADERSHIP IS NOT** achieved by the **casting of ballots** or the **attendance at seminars**.

#### **TRUE LEADERSHIP** is realized through <u>prayers</u> and <u>tears</u>.

2 Tim. 1:3-4 "...remembrance of thee in my prayers...mindful of thy tears..."

### **LEADERSHIP IS a blending** of **human** and **divine qualities**.

Mark 10:43-45 "... whosoever shall be great among you, shall be your minister;... whosoever of you would be the chiefest, shall be servant of all..."

- Leaders are both <u>born</u> and <u>made</u>. 1 Tim. 1:12, "And I thank Christ Jesus our Lord, who hath enabled me, for that he counted me faithful, putting me into the ministry."
- Leaders do <u>not procrastinate</u> nor <u>vacillate</u>. Luke 9:62, "No man, having put his hand to the plow, and looking back, is fit for the kingdom of God."
- Leadership calls for courage. Joshua 1:9, "... be of good courage... be not afraid..."
- **Leadership requires** <u>humility</u>. 1 Peter 5:5, "... Yea, all of you be subject one to another, and be clothed with humility:" Matt. 23:12, "And whosoever shall exalt himself shall be abased; and he that shall humble himself shall be exalted."
- **Leadership requires <u>humor</u>**. Be able to relax and defuse a tense problem before it gets to us.
- **Leadership requires patience with meekness.** Rom. 5:3; "...tribulation worketh patience." 1 Tim. 5:11 "In meekness instructing those that oppose him..."
- **Leadership requires gentleness.** 2 Tim. 2:24 "And the servant of the Lord must not strive; but be gentle unto all men..."
- Leadership requires <u>tact</u>. Matt. 22:17-21 DIPLOMACY – Skillful in handling tense situations. A bad situation could be made worse through the wrong choice of words.

**A tact-<u>less</u> approach**: The shoe salesperson says to a woman: "*I'm sorry madam, but your foot is too large for the shoe.*"

A tact-full approach: "I'm sorry madam, but that shoe is too small for your foot."
